Meeting

Mr. Phillips opened the meeting at 5:30 p.m.

Appointments - Dog Hearing continued - Charles Patenaude, 60 Purinton Road - To recap the dog hearing to date:

- 1.) On July 26, 2022, The Buckland Select Board voted to declare the aforementioned dogs as nuisance animals, in accordance with <u>MGL Ch 140 Sec 157</u> and notified the owner of that decision.
- 2.) Said order specified: a.) that the dog(s) be humanely restrained: provided, however, that no order shall provide that a dog deemed dangerous be chained, tethered or otherwise tied to an inanimate object including, but not limited to, a tree, post, or building.
- 3.) On March 21, 2023, The Buckland Select Board held a 2nd hearing to hear testimony that the dog owner was in violation of the order: New statements were made by Animal Control Officer, abutters and the dog owners, which included statements by the owner admitting that the dogs are allowed off leash and permitted in the public way.
- 4.) Evidence is clear the owners have not duly restrained the dogs as required by the Notice of Decision and thereby are knowingly creating an unsafe situation for the dogs and motorists and have further impeded town snow removal operations.

Hearing continued:

Mr. Patenaude stated he watched all the videos submitted by the complainants, and addressed the content of the videos. In his opinion he was doing the best he could do, to which Mr. Del Castilho responded that it was not enough. Mr. Phillips stated that he himself is a "dog person" whose dogs are under his control; the order issued to Mr. Patenaude in July 2022 was for him to control any dog he owns, which he has failed to do.

Mr. Patenaude's wife (Terri Haire) asked the rhetorical questions of are they the best dog owners or trainers? No. But then offered the statement that the dogs are important to them and to Mr. Patenaude's well being.

Kyle Dragon, ACO, reported that it appeared that the dog, Bella, is the pack leader and asked Mr. Patenaude if he would consider relinquishing that one dog. Ms. Haire said the reason they rescued Bella was because she was always tethered, a background to which she attributes Bella's current behavior.

Mr. Phillips moved to remove Bella (female dog) from Mr. Patenaude's 60 Purinton Road residence, and that work continue to control the other two dogs. Mr. Wells seconded. During discussion, Mr. Phillips warned that if the Select Board continues to

receive complaints regarding the remaining two dogs, they also will be relinquished. Vote in favor of the motion was unanimous.

Mr. Patenaude asked Mr. Dragon if the Franklin County Sheriff's Dog Shelter is a kill shelter. Mr. Dragon assured him it is not, and relayed a story to him of a German Shepard who was adopted from their shelter and now has a successful career as a K-9 officer in a police department in another state.

Agenda items

> FY24 Budget - Proposition 2 1/2 Override Discussion - Finance Committee members were present to defend and discuss the FY24 budget and the likelihood of a Proposition 2 1/2 Override as well as the ramifications in the event it does not pass; severe cuts are projected. Education and town operations were identified as the two main areas of the budget; and most recently, police staffing mandates have driven the costs of policing significantly upward. Board members were given packets containing copies of the FY2024 Buckland Revenue/Expense Analysis, FY2024 Buckland Operating Budget, a spread sheet for recommended salary increases, and a history of past Buckland override votes, the last one in 2007.

Mr. Del Castilho stated that there would have to be reason to support going to voters with an override. Override discussion followed, but no recommendations for proposed budget cuts will be made until override is decided at town meeting. Ms. Willmore stated that perhaps we have been too conservative for too long and it has "come home to roost."

Ms. Butler addressed budget changes with respect to staff; specifically the treasurer/collector and highway department positions were recognized for their valuable contributions and recommended for salary increases. She emphasized that she wants Buckland positions to be competitive to keep employees from seeking employment elsewhere. Ms. Butler also reported that some municipalities lease personnel for the treasurer/collector position and pointed to the benefits of having an in-house person committed to the job and the town. Discussion followed on recognizing the worth of employees and expressing that through competitive wages.

> **Buckland Recreation** - Pool project update - Ms. Guyette began the presentation by stating that the roof is on the pool house and the skylights are in; electricians will be on site Friday; project is on schedule. Pool deck is being extended 2' for handicap access and to comfortably accommodate lounge chairs.

Ms. Schwartz presented proposed rate sheets for use of the facility; individual and family pool passes both resident and non-resident, with comparison to 2016 prices when pool was last open. Price schedules were also given for pavilion rentals, swimming lessons, and water fitness classes, both resident and non-resident, as well as brief job descriptions and requirements for lifeguards and pool park attendants with corresponding pay. Ms. Schwartz reported that a swimming instructor has been secured.

Mr. Del Castilho asked what portion of project cost was Buckland tax payer money vs grant money, followed by discussion on pool budget/financing.

Discussion proceeded to resident vs non-resident pricing, non-resident vs out of school district as another possible classification, with Mr. Phillips suggesting extending a resident rate to the Mohawk District for the first year. Ms. Schwartz responded that budget/pricing has been calculated based on resident/non-resident usage.

Opening day for the season will be July 1st and anticipated closing date will be Labor Day, unless employee shortages caused by students returning to college (or similar circumstances) make it impossible to adequately staff the facility.

A Mohawk Summer Camp Agreement was also in the packet submitted by Ms. Guyette and Ms. Schwartz. Mr. Phillips moved to accept the Summer Camp Agreement, seconded by Mr. Wells. Vote in favor of the motion was unanimous.

Ms. Schwartz thanked everyone who has respected the no trespassing signs/orders for the recreation area for the duration of the pool project.

Town Administrator Report - Ms. Butler gave an overview of the Rural Downtown Pilot Project and the persons that would comprise the steering committee; a consultant will be hired to assess the needs of the downtown area and work with committee members. The Board will do committee appointments after elections, but since Mr. Wells is the Board's task force delegate, he will also serve on the steering committee until that time. The Shelburne task force delegate is also serving as their steering committee member making for continuity on committees and between the towns. Brief discussion followed on areas Pilot Project might focus.

Regarding the Conway Street TIP project, construction will resume on April 3 with one crew on sidewalks and one on culverts. Unfortunately, South Street will be closed with

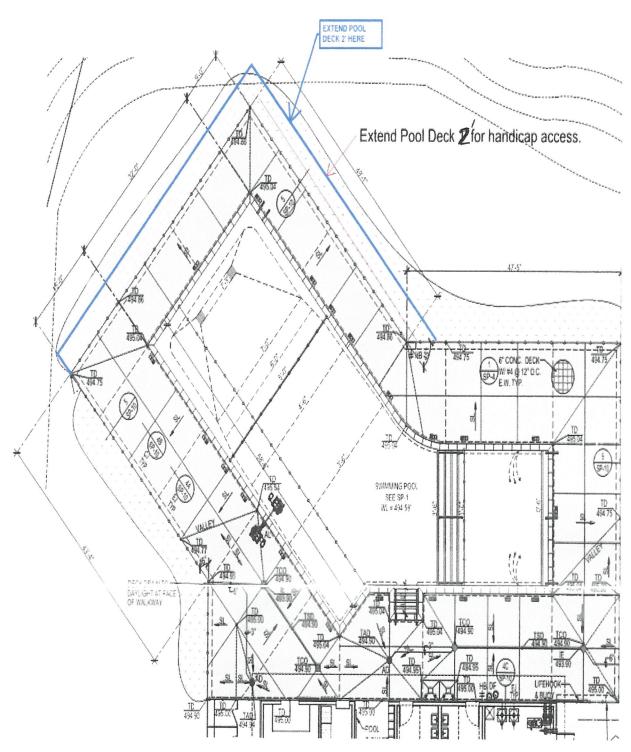

435.12: continued

(3) All tiled swimming, wading and special purpose pools constructed or drained after the effective date of these regulations for routine re-grouting or tile work shall have a boundary line between the shallow and deep areas installed with a four inch stripe of contrasting color on the floor and walls of the pool. Ledges and step edges shall also be marked with a four inch stripe of contrasting color.



435.13: Walkways and Decks

- (1) Walkways shall be continuous around the pool with a minimum width of four feet of unobstructed clear distance including a curb at the pool edge, if such a curb is used. Walkways of a width of eight feet are desirable. A minimum of three feet walk width shall be provided around any piece of diving equipment. All walks, decks, and terraces shall have a minimum slope of ¼ inch per foot toward adequate drains or points at which the water will have a free unobstructed flow away from the pool to approved points of disposal.
- (2) All walkway and deck surfaces shall be furnished with a slip resistant non-abrasive surface.

435.14: Ladders and Steps

- (1) A minimum of one ladder shall be provided for each 75 feet of swimming pool perimeter, and not less than two such devices shall be provided at any pool. If step-holes are provided in lieu of ladders, they shall be readily cleanable and sloped slightly, or provided with drain holes, to prevent accumulation of dirt. A suitable handrail extending to the pool deck or curb shall be provided at each side of each ladder or step-holes. Recessed stairsteps may be substituted for ladders or step holes. A suitable handrail shall be provided at one side or in the center of stairsteps.
- (2) For each special purpose pool a minimum of one handrail or ladder equivalent shall be provided, or there shall be a deck designed to facilitate safe entry or exit.

435.15: Diving

- (1) Diving equipment shall be rigidly constructed and properly anchored with sufficient bracing to insure stability under the heaviest reasonable load. Diving boards shall be of sound construction, free from splinters or dangerous cracks, and shall be capable of supporting the heaviest load under conditions of reasonable use. Diving boards and platforms shall be covered or finished with durable non-slip material.
- (2) Diving areas constructed or approved for construction prior to April 1, 1998 shall conform with the requirements of 105 CMR 435.00 in effect at the time of construction and/or approval.
- (3) No diving board or platform more than one meter above the pool water level shall be permitted for general public use in any swimming pool. At least 13 feet of free and unobstructed head room shall be provided above diving boards and platforms. This distance shall be measured from the center of the front end of the board and shall extend horizontally at least eight feet behind, eight feet to each side, and 16 feet ahead of the front of the diving board.
- (4) Diving areas approved for competitive diving shall be in compliance with the standards of the Federation Internationale DeNation Ameteur (FINA), U.S. Diving, Inc., or the National College Athletic Association (NCAA).
- (5) Platforms and diving equipment which are one meter or higher shall be protected with guard rails. The required guard rails shall extend at least 30 inches above the diving board and extend to the edge of the pool wall. All platform or diving equipment higher than one meter shall have guard rails which extend at least 36 inches above the diving board and extend to the edge of the pool wall.

435.16: Water Source

Water to be used in any swimming, wading or special purpose pool shall be obtained from a source approved by the Board of Health.

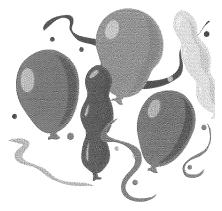
